- Asset security the EPBC listed black-flanked rock-wallaby – Coordinated Predator Control



- Not so much about meaningful control of invasives












# Red Card — community participation direct action

## Focus is on getting community active in this space













## Red Card - Average number of feral cats removed per person

## 645 in total over 3 years





More than 250 individual project sites across the Avon River basin at present





Heading to the higher intensity end of the spectrum – we have more intensive threat management for high priority assets – in this case the EPBC listed Black-flanked rock-wallaby

















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
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#### Locations of fixed and mobile traps across project target area

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
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
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


















































#### Density of cats removed May 2015 – June 2016







#### Density of cats removed July 2017 – May 2018










#### Locations of foxes and cats removed, by species and sex – whole period

- Fox, Male





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






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#### How did we go after the first effort 2015/16?

- More Black-flanked rock-wallabies landholders and DBCA
- Less predation of stock
- Lower number of residential predator populations
- Much lower incidence of recolonisation from invasives
- Movement around an between granite habitats

Evidence that sites specific control can have a significant impact in a fragmented landscape







#### From here?

- Currently the project operates on less than 10% of the initial effort2015/16
- Very stripped down version of initial effort
- One operator 3 days per month simply cannot create the same impact
- We still have a downward trend but it is much flatter


